In the context of our family life, she's one of eight children, and she's our only child with hearing loss. And while we would have been willing, as a family, to do whatever would've been best for her-- would have been the best communication approach-- for her to actually be able to listen and have spoken language has been remarkable.

And it has been so powerful to see her be able to communicate with her siblings on such a deep level. She has a huge love for literature. I believe that Listening and Spoken Language, that that approach, has allowed her to delve more deeply into literature, into writing, into expression. I think that to be able to gift a child through technology and through a really powerful early interventionist with Listening and Spoken Language allows the horizon to be broader for them. And that's definitely the experience that we've had for Maesy.
